DTaP and Tdap vaccinations are currently available to all children, regardless of insurance status, but the state may change this at any time.

WHY VACCINES ARE IMPORTANT

The United States has record or near record low levels of vaccine-preventable childhood diseases, but that does not mean these have disappeared.

Many of the viruses and bacteria are still circulating in this country or are only a plane ride away. That's why it's important that children, especially infants and young children, receive recommended immunizations on time. It's true that newborn babies are immune to many diseases because they have antibodies they received from their mothers. However, the duration of this immunity may last only a month to about a year. Further, young children do not have maternal immunity against some vaccine preventable diseases, such as whooping cough.

If a child is not vaccinated and is exposed to a vaccine-preventable disease, the child's body may not be strong enough to fight the disease. Before vaccines, many children died from diseases that vaccines now prevent, such as whooping cough, measles, and polio. Those same diseases exist today, but babies are now protected by vaccines, so we do not see these diseases as often.
